The Tiger-Cat Club has stepped up contributing services, amenities and financial

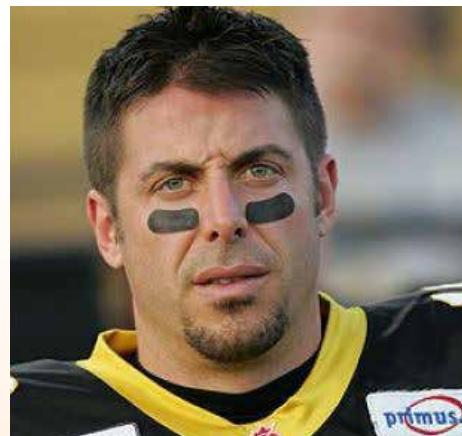
assistance in the creation and maintenance of the room. The Alumni Association is continuing a capital fundraising campaign to assist in construction costs, furniture and decor.

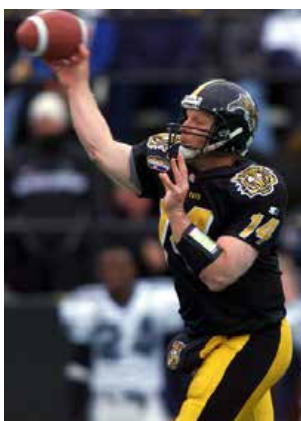
MCMASTER FOOTBALL GALA

DANNY MCMANUS TO BE INDUCTED INTO GRIDIRON GREATS HALL OF FAME



Tiger-Cat Alumnus Danny McManus will be among the latest inductees into the Gridiron Great Hall of Fame.

The Gridiron Greats group helps former players who need assistance in their post-career lives. According to the website, some 1,500 former players have received some sort of assistance. Inductees are honoured not just for their careers but also for giving back to the game after they've stopped playing it.

In 2012, Angelo Mosca was the first Tiger-Cat Alumnus and the first former CFL player, to be inducted into the Gridiron Greats Hall of Fame. Other CFL alumni since inducted include one-time Ti-Cat Matt Dunigan, George Reed, Hugh Campbell, Ray Elgaard and Marv Levy.

Joining McManus in the 2016 inductees are New York Jets legends Joe Namath and Don Maynard, and a trio of other NFL quarterbacks: Billy Kilmer, Daryl Lamonica and Dan Pastorini



This year's event will be held on Saturday, June 3rd at the Silverton Casino & Hotel in Las Vegas. Tickets to the induction dinner are \$250 each.

CAREER

1. Tell us about how you got started in football and your amateur career.

I was interested in playing football when I was about 7 or so and about 60 pounds. The game looked like fun and was told to come back next year as I too light. I tried out for the high school team in grade 9 but quit after all my friends were cut. I finally started playing in grade 10.

2. How did you get started in the CFL (draft, free agent, trade etc.)?

I was a protected choice of the Toronto Argonauts in 1977.

3. Do or did you hold any records?

At the time of retirement I held 3 CFL records: most punt return carries & yards and most interception returns yards.

4. Do or did you have a nickname?

Affectionally known as Badger....a name given to me by Ben Zambiasi during training camp in St. Catherine's.

5. Tell us about some of your fondest memories with the Tiger-Cats or in the CFL.

Winning the 1986 Grey Cup after losing in 1984 and 1985.....it truly was a great team....awesome defense, great team leaders and offense that clicked when needed most and a solid kicking game...Ozzie was great! Just as important as the players were the great coaches led by Al Bruno.

I have never been on a team where a coaching strategy was instrumental in overcoming a winning offense strategy - the 1983 Grey Cup Champions Argos and their complicated "Run and Shoot" - special thanks to Rich Stubler and Ted Schmidt for their creative genius.

A big thank you to GM Joe Zuger for putting the winning pieces together and finally, and by no means last, the very supportive Ti-Cat fans!! Oh, one last guy....Ray Jones....thanks

buzzard for keeping us taped up and on the field.

My 2002 induction into the CFHOF was my next most memorable experience.

6. Who were some of the team-mates and opponents you admired the most and why?

Gee there's really too many to mention and I feel that it would be unfair / disrespectful to leave somebody off of that list....and let's remember that on any team there are so many little contributions made that all add up to equal major contributions.....so let's go with the 1986 team as a whole. Regarding my opponents, how about I go with "our" opponents as there was a great deal of respect for all that we played against.

7. Which coach did you respect or enjoy playing for the most and why?

For me there are two....Al Bruno as the HC because he knew how to balance things and his loyalty and respect for his veteran players was very much appreciated. From a strategic perspective it was Rich Stubler. Not just for his creativity, but for his understanding of me as a person and his being OK with letting me play my game within the team concept.

8. Tell us about some of your favourite Grey Cup memories.

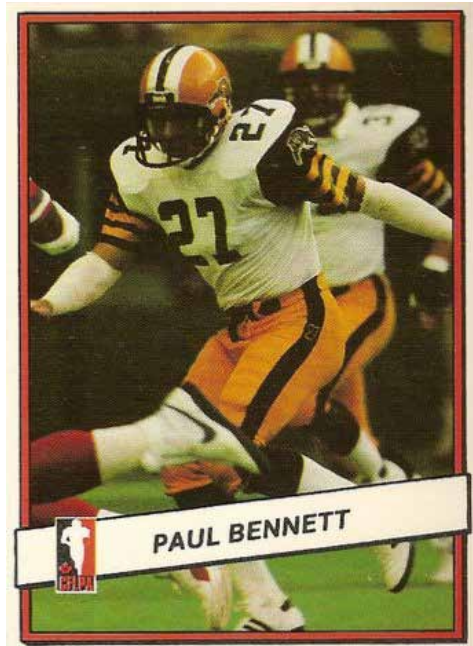
1986...14 to 17 point underdogs as I recall.....watching Mike Kerrigan hit Steve Stapler on an out and up for a TD....WOW!. Ozzie being perfect. Dan Huclack as the game's leading rusher. The feeling of a defense that was not to be denied as 10 turnovers were created against the yet be CFHOF'ers Matt Dunigan and Damon Allen. So much for the yellow haired Nike swooshes!..... finally holding the Grey Cup and surrounded by your teammates.....there's nothing like that feeling.

Worked in jobs at mostly 8 year increments.... radio sales, MTS (now Bell), HR recruitment and now as a part time associate with Home Depot...ya, I am semi-retired.

Married to my high school sweetie, Patti Ling, and we share a blended family that includes 5 adult children; Renee, Dylan, Melissa,



Mackenzie and Kendall plus two grandchildren, Ava and our latest shining star Emma.

10. Tell us about your interests, hobbies, your passion or anything else you would like to. Share about yourself.

Season Preview

Last year the Tiger-Cats came within a whisker of a third straight berth in the Grey Cup.

Only a miraculous play by the Ottawa RedBlacks in the Eastern Final deprived the Cats of a third consecutive kick at Earl Grey's Cup.

Hamilton enters the 2016 season with renewed optimism and hopefully a healthy team for most of the year. The Tiger-Cats are coming off a 10-8 record and a tie with the Argos for second place in the East.

"Our expectations are always the same," says Head Coach Kent Austin, commenting on the 2016 campaign. "The goal is to win the championship. That's our only goal.

"On offence, I think we have the experience," says Austin. "We have a strong quarterback group. We're good up front. We have receivers with experience. We feel good

about what we have. We have to start the season fast but if we have a loss we just have to keep playing well. So much depends on staying healthy."

Former McMaster Marauder Head Coach and CFL wide receiver Stefan Ptaszek takes over the reigns as new Offensive Coordinator. Ptaszek spent 10 years at the helm of the Marauders and was a first round draft pick of the BC Lions in 1994.

QB Zach Collaros is expected to miss the first month of the season as a result of last year's torn ACL. Once healthy, he will once again lead a high-powered offence that includes the likes of Luke Tasker, Andy Fantuz, Tiquan Underwood, Spencer Watt, Terrence Toliver and Chad Owens as receivers. A healthy Collaros is critical as the Tabbies struggled last year when he went down with a season-ending injury. Incumbents Jeremiah Masoli, Jacory Harris and Jeff Mathews will shoulder the load for at least the first month of the season. C.J. Gable should be the featured running back and also needs to rebound from an injury-shortened season last year. The O-line is solid with leaders Peter Dyakowski, Ryan Bomben, Mike Filer and Jake Olson.

Defensively, the Ti-Cats should be able to duplicate their fine effort in 2015. The squad will be anchored by veterans such as DT Ted Laurent, LB Simoni Lawrence and DB Courtney

Stephen. DB Craig Butler is expected to miss the year with an ACL injury while DT Linden Gaydos is healthy after missing last year with an injury. Newly acquired DE John Chick will be an asset.

"We have a chance to be a real good defence," says Austin. "We have a couple of holes to fill but our job is to have the next guy ready. We expect to be competitive."

While the Tiger-Cats lost one the league's best kickers in Justin Medlock, they did re-sign one of the best return specialists in Brandon Banks.

"On special teams Jeff (Reinebold) does an outstanding job. We have to replace Justin (Medlock) and we have put a lot of time and resources into that," Austin says.

"Overall we are just grinding towards the start line and want to be well-prepared," Austin adds. "We are really excited with the talent we have signed."

High School to Hard Knocks

It is a road less travelled.

A road that leads directly from high school to the pros.

For most players the journey to the CFL is a linear one that leads from high school to university or college and finally to the big leagues.

There was a time however when the feat of bypassing university wasn't quite so unique.

Here are three who made the transition directly from high school to the Tiger-Cats.

BOB KROUSE

Bob Krouse was a Tiger-Cat fixture at linebacker for 13 seasons. He was a four-time Grey Cup champion (1963, 65, 67 and 72), a team captain, an Eastern all-star as well as a back-up running back and sometime defensive back.

Krouse was an outstanding athlete in both football and track and field at Hamilton's Central Secondary School. He and his teammates set a Canadian high school record in the mile relay (3:26:8) and Krouse was the quarter mile champion. On the gridiron, Central won the Hamilton high school championship three years in a row while Krouse was there. One of his opponents from Westdale was future Canadian Football Hall of Famer Jim Young. "We were good friends and I remember I popped his shoulder out on one play," says Krouse.

"When I was in Grade nine the two phys-ed teachers pulled me aside and said that I should come out for football and that I could probably play pro" said Krouse.

"When I was in Grade 13 they had a high school evaluation camp at Civic Stadium run by the Tiger-Cat coaches. I think it was the oldest such camp in North America. Each

high school was asked to send a couple of players and I was one of the players chosen by my school. I felt very secure. I went as a running back and had good speed. Ralph Sazio was in his first year as head coach. Jake Gaudaur gave me \$1,000 as a bonus and said, 'If you don't make the team, you can keep it.'"

The \$1,000 proved to be a pretty good investment by Gaudaur.

"That first training camp was overwhelming," says Krouse. "Garney Henley was my hero. I wore #26 and here he is in the same locker room as me. You're awestruck but I made the team. But it wasn't enough just to be there. You had to contribute, on special teams or wherever they put you.

"I remember my first game. It was against Montreal and Don Clark and George Dixon were back to receive the opening kickoff. I was on the Ti-Cats' kickoff team and ran down field past one of them; I don't remember which one and hit the other one. In my mind I literally saw stars. I thought to myself, 'this is different'. But you learn, you pick up and you watch."

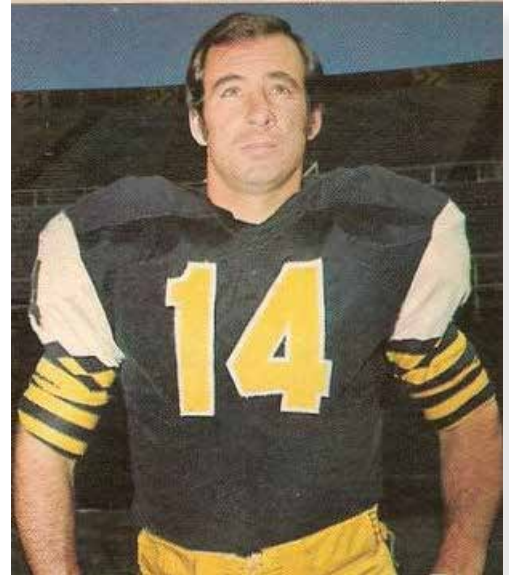
Indeed Krouse learned his lessons well and parlayed it into a 13 year career and recognition as a member of the all-time Tiger-Cat team and Wall of Honour in 2012 and an induction into the Hamilton Sports Hall of Fame in 2014.

BILL GRAHAM

Bill Graham was a Tiger-Cat halfback from 1953-60 and played on two-Grey Cup winning teams (1953 and 57). He was a multi-sport athlete at St. Andrew's College in Aurora. Graham played football,

hockey, track, cricket and boxing.

"We had a lot of good football teams in high school," he says, "but I left after Grade 12 because I had a chance to play junior hockey with the Guelph Biltmores. "I played



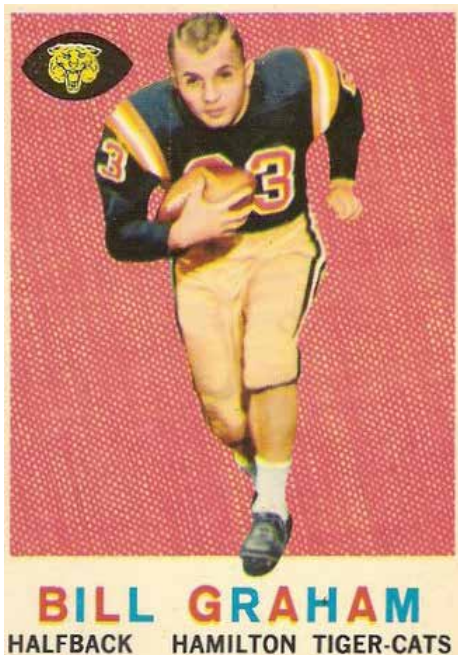
junior hockey in the winter and in the summer (1951) came home to Hamilton. The Hamilton Tiger Cats Old Boys Association was holding a high school football clinic at Civic Stadium. I rode my bicycle down and twelve of us were chosen to move on to a junior training camp where we would get a tryout for the Tiger-Cats. I just kept moving up the ladder and before I knew it, I was at training camp and then my first exhibition game and then I made the team."

"I felt elated," says Graham. "I wasn't really intimidated; it was mostly euphoria that I was there. The great thing is that a lot of guys took an interest in me; I was just 17 years old."

"When we had little scrimmages I would try to line up against Ralph Sazio. He was a pretty tough guy and I wanted to be the tough guy. Later

on I was always proud that whenever he was on the lecture circuit (coach) Jim Trimble called me 'pound for pound the toughest man in Canadian football.'"

Graham left the Ti-Cats for two years to play with the Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen of the old ORFU where he suited up with the likes of Cookie Gilchrist and Bobby Kuntz. "They were great years," he says, "but the Tiger-Cats bought out my



contract and I was glad to return to my hometown in 1957. It was five minutes from my house."

Graham retired from the Ti-Cats in 1960 and played a year with the London Lords.

Following his CFL days, Graham embarked on a very successful business career including becoming president of his own investment firm, University Scholarships of Canada. "I've had a great family life as well with six children, all girls, and five grandchildren," he says.

Today, the 80-year-old lives in Mississauga. "I still follow the Tiger-Cats," he says. "They were great years with some really good people. I have had season's tickets from 1955 up until last year. I finally gave them up because I am away a lot and

spend half my time up on the Bruce Peninsula where I have a farm."

PETE NEUMANN

Pete Neumann played defensive end for the Tiger-Cats for 14 seasons (1951-1964). He was a nine-time Eastern all-star and won three Grey Cups (1953, 57 and 63). He was named to the Tiger-Cats Wall of Honour in 2011 and was inducted into the Canadian Football Hall of Fame in 1979.

Neumann played football at St. Catharines Collegiate High School. "We had some pretty good teams and won the Red Feather Tournament in Toronto, I think it was 1950," he says. "The tournament was for all the high schools in Southern Ontario.

"At that time I never gave any thought to playing pro ball," says Neumann, who also played baseball and hockey during his high school days. "Both Toronto and Hamilton contacted me and wanted to come down and see me. The guy from Toronto never showed up so I went with Hamilton. They signed me up and I went to my first training camp in 1951."

The Argos' loss was the Ti-Cats gain.

"It was like night and day," Neumann says of his introduction to the pro game. "Coming right out of high school, to me they were monster linemen and everybody was bigger and faster. I did the best I

could and they really took a shine to the speed I had. At that time I was very quick. Over time I became great friends with most of the players especially Bernie Custis."

"At that age you don't think of that, coming directly from high school. You just say, 'my goodness I'm going to play pro ball,' he adds. "Not like a kid in a candy store but more like, 'wow I was going to play professional football.' It was an exciting time."

Neumann suited up for the Tiger-Cats first exhibition game that year against Toronto. "The game was played at old War Memorial Stadium in Buffalo, he says. "Joe Krol was still playing for Toronto. I played probably a quarter and I think I



tackled Krol on one play."

Neumann obviously impressed the Tiger-Cat coaches as he stayed with the club and went on to a 14-year Canadian Football Hall of Fame career with Hamilton.

The 85-year-old still lives in St. Catharines and despite a bad knee and bad back, "tries to keep busy."

I used to do a lot of biking and skating," says the former Tiger-Cat star. "Now I have a bad knee and a bad back so I just try to keep busy."

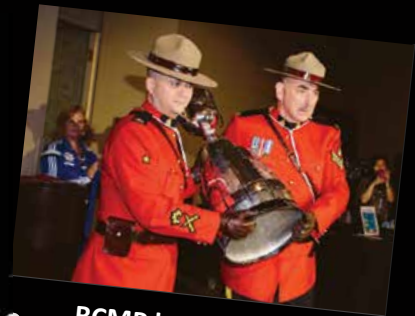

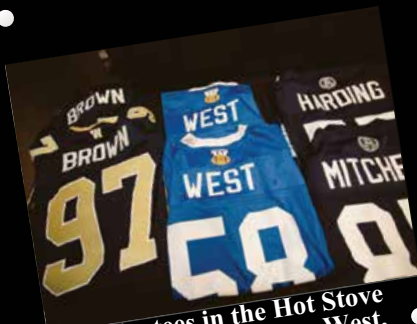

In Conversation With... Dick Easterly

I recently had a great and uplifting conversation with former Hamilton Tiger Cat #20, Dick Easterly. Dick played for the Cats from 1962 to 1964, and participated the 1962 Grey Cup Fog Bowl game and the victorious 1963 Grey Cup game that will always be remembered for the infamous hit that Angelo Mosca made on BC's star running back Willie Fleming.

Dick Easterly had an outstanding collegiate career at Syracuse University. He was a multi-talented athlete who excelled in basketball, baseball and football. It was football however that landed him a university scholarship. In 1960 Dick mainly played defensive back, a position that he excelled in however he also was the back-up quarterback for the Syracuse Orangemen. That team went 11-0 and won the Cotton Bowl and the U.S. National Collegiate Football Championship. In 1961 Dick was the QB, receiver and captain of the Orangemen and MVP of both the 1961 Liberty Bowl game and the Blue Grey All Star game.

Dick was drafted by the San Francisco 49ers in the 1962 draft but was also contacted by the Denver Broncos. When he tried to report to the Broncos he was informed that he couldn't because his rights were apparently owned by the Buffalo Bills. Dick also found out that a CFL team called the Hamilton Tiger Cats had him ranked number one on their negotiation list so he decided to report to the Tiger Cats. Jake Gaudaur was the G.M. and Jim Trimble was the coach of the Cats at the time and they welcomed him with open arms.

Dick's first impression of Hamilton was extremely positive. He liked the downtown area particularly the park (Gore Park) in the centre of the city. He initially stayed at the Royal Connaught Hotel but later moved into an apartment with his wife on the hill as he put it.

Dick's roommate during the out of town road trips was Angelo Mosca who had just returned to the Ti-Cats after a year with Ottawa and a short stint with Montreal. He and Mosca developed a strong relationship that has lasted to this day.

Although he was recruited by the Cats as a QB/DB, Dick's first taste of Canadian Professional Football found him in a flanker's position (known today as a slot back) where he caught 2 long touchdown passes from Joe



Zuger. As special as that game seemed to be another even greater event occurred that same evening with the birth of his first daughter.

In 1962 Dick played for Jim Trimble who he described as a very firm no nonsense type of coach, but at least you knew where you stood with him. In 1963 there was a coaching change and Ralph Sazio was in charge and, although he was somewhat similar to Trimble, he was more demanding to play for, according to Dick.

On the positive side Dick mentioned a list of great team mates that he had the distinct pleasure of playing with such as Angelo Mosca, Garney Henley, Joe Zuger, Gene Cepetelli, Don Sutherin, Ralph Goldston, Willy Bethea, Art Baker, Joe Cannavino and Dave Viti. He also mentioned how talented and good the Canadians were that he played with like Tommy Grant, Bob Krouse, Pete Neumann, Zeno Karcz, Bobby Kuntz and Frank Cosentino. He then mentioned Hal Patterson and stated that Patterson had to be one of the greatest players that ever played the game.

He remembered a game in Edmonton when both he and Patterson were lined up on the

same side of the field for a pass. On the snap of the ball Patterson was levelled at the line of scrimmage and when he looked back he was sucker punched so there they both were spread eagle on the field and the QB had no one to throw to. This added some comic relief for the players and coaches when they were gathered together to review the post-game films and clearly see the both of them laid out flat on the field during that play.

There were memorable games that Dick said he remembered such as the victorious 1963 Grey Cup game in Vancouver and the 1962 Grey Cup fog bowl in Toronto where the visibility was so poor in the last quarter of the game it had to be stopped and finished the following day. Another game that stood out for him was a game in Regina in 1962 where the downpour of rain was so intense and constant it was virtually impossible to see the opposing player in front of you during most of the game. As a result of the extreme poor weather conditions the final score of that game was more like a hockey score than a football score. The game ended something like 3-2 or 5-3 in favour of Regina.



Similar to previously interviewed Tiger Cat Legends, Dick stated that he enjoyed his playing days in Hamilton and a main contributing factor were the fans. The fan support as he put it was terrific. He said that he got to meet countless number of great Tiger Cat fans personally and made many friends. He labelled Hamilton football fans as hard working, down-to-earth people.

Dick made a special tribute to Bernie Custis, who he remembered as a great football player at Syracuse and in Hamilton. He called Custis a true gentleman and a real fine person. He also mentions Tony Gabriel as another Syracuse alumnus that did well in the CFL.

Dick Easterly was recognized for his athletic accomplishments and was inducted into the Greater Syracuse Sports Hall of Fame in 2012. He and wife Mary now live in Florida where he is still very active in his Financial Planning Business which he states " keeps him out of trouble at home".

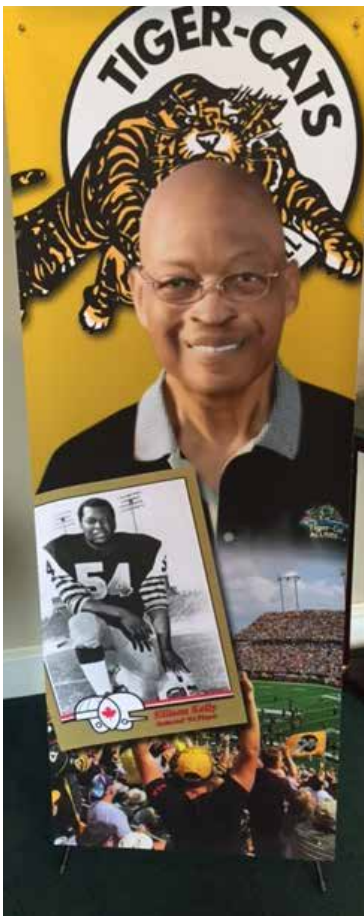
